When the AGNS reopened in June after needed infrastructure work, visitors were treated to two incredible exhibitions: *Mitchell Wiebe: VampSites*, developed by Confederation Centre of the Arts, and *Denyse Thomasos: just beyond*, organized by the Art Gallery of Ontario and the Remai Modern.

In the fall, we welcomed contemporary artists Jennifer Marman and Daniel Borins for the opening of their exhibition *Three Dimensions*, in collaboration with Contemporary Calgary. This exhibition played an important role in engaging visitors as the AGNS experienced another temporary maintenance closure, this time of the North building.

A particular highlight of the past year was the launch of the new emerging artist platform; a program aimed at giving space and opportunities to an artist at the formative stage of their practice. This initiative launched with the opening of *OH BABY*, which featured new works by local, award-winning artist Séamus Gallagher.

We continued to connect with Nova Scotians through our art education workshops and artist-led programs, reaching nearly 4,000 youth, making an important impact in communities around the province.

# **2024-25 EXHIBITIONS**

The Art Gallery of Nova Scotia's exhibition program is woven with the principles of collaboration, engagement, diversity, stewardship, and ongoing support for artists. This year, the AGNS built partnerships locally, nationally, and internationally, while also focusing on Atlantic Canadian art and artists.





## Mitchell Wiebe: VampSites

Halifax-based artist Mitchell Wiebe imported the chaos and theatre of his studio into an art museum in *VampSites*. Wiebe employed a surreal personal lexicon and mythology of colours and textures, motifs, and narratives; filling the space with an array of fantastical animalesque characters. Optical effects coincided with pop culture references

as Wiebe played with the procedures and boundaries of painting, with the ebb and flow of its credibility. The installation responded to the architecture of the Gallery, combining Wiebe's distinctive paintings with documentation of a sprawling residency in a Cold War bunker and a black light gallery.

process and works to guests.

## **Denyse Thomasos: just beyond**

This first-ever career retrospective of the late
Trinidadian-Canadian artist,
Denyse Thomasos: just
beyond was a celebration of the painter and her singular voice in modern abstraction.
Inquisitive and socially conscious about the systems and institutions around her,
Thomasos commonly wove a political thread throughout her practice.

The never-before-seen studio footage and personal journals in this exhibition provided glimpses into the artist's innermost thoughts, her rigorous research practice, and the gradual development of her unique artistic language. Thomasos' skillful use of colour, her confident lines, and challenging narratives were evident in every stage of her brief yet remarkable career.

## Ta'n a'sikatikl sipu'l | Confluence

This Permanent Collection exhibition, the *Mi'kma'ki* Artists' Spotlight, and the (*Tea*)chings space each saw new artists highlighted.

## (Tea)chings: Sircle of Sisters

(Tea)chings is a space for artwork created through Indigenous-centered programming by community members of all ages. This year's (Tea)chings space showcased quillwork created by 16 members of the Sircle of Sisters program at the Mi'kmaw Native Friendship Centre, led by artist Cheryl Simon. The group explored Mi'kmaw cultural values, legal protocols, and history embedded in the art form of quillwork while creating pieces of their own.

## Mi'kma'ki Artists' Spotlight: The Quill Sisters

This spotlight section of *Ta'n* a'sikatikl sipu'l | Confluence celebrates the work being done by Indigenous artists across Mi'kma'ki.

Artist trio The Quill Sisters (Melissa Peter-Paul, Kay Sark, and Cheryl Simon) have collaborated for several years to rekindle the art form of quillwork, while igniting discussions on treaty rights, climate change, sustainability, and reciprocity. Each artist used traditional approaches using birchbark embellishment techniques, while expanding mediums with conceptual connections to this contemporary and historical practice.

### **Jennifer Marman & Daniel Borins: Three Dimensions**

Three Dimensions showcased the multidisciplinary art practice of Jennifer Marman and Daniel Borins, including three installations: Balancing Act, THX2020, and ABCD, which combined painting, sculpture, kinetics, interactivity, virtual reality, and video.

Visitors were encouraged to participate and 'play' with some of the installations,

exploring themes of authenticity, agency, and the digital age through performativity and interactivity.

The exhibition aimed to disrupt traditional notions of reality—whether authentic or synthetic—and presented dimensions that challenged the viewer's perception.

Marman and Borins prompted contemplation around visual language, mass media, consumerism, and the ways in which images circulate in the information age.

## Séamus Gallagher: OH BABY

OH BABY, a new body of work by emerging artist Séamus Gallagher, combined photo, video, drag, speculative fiction, sculpture, and costuming, inspired by a forest fire in Arizona in 2017 caused by a gender reveal explosion. Gallagher imagined what it might mean to be assigned a forest fire at birth amid a collapsing climate.

Gallagher examined the way human-made technologies and constructs frame our worldviews, and fail us as a result. They work from the belief that various ways of working, histories, narratives, and ideas can—and must—exist alongside one another: the camp and the critical, the past and the future, the natural and the other.

OH BABY kicked off the AGNS' emerging artist program, which will support and foster rising contemporary artists from Atlantic Canada and cumulate into a bi-annual exhibition at the AGNS.

# Nova Scotia Spotlight: Alex Livingston



## Mike MacDonald: Touched by the Tears of a Butterfly

During the North Building closure our Multi-Purpose Room featured a dynamic art installation by Mi'kmaw artist Mike MacDonald (1941-2006). The work was a silent video that featured a monarch butterfly emerging from a chrysalis, followed by a montage of butterflies pollinating various flora and fauna.

# 2024-25 PROGRAMS

The Art Gallery of Nova Scotia delivered a range of programs inviting people of diverse backgrounds, ages, and abilities to engage with art. The Permanent Collection and special exhibitions provided the framework for these programs. This year, the AGNS hosted hands-on activities, lecturestyle and panel artist talks, pop-up artmaking, and collaborative partner programs to bring art to people around the province.





## Make Day!

The Make Day program brought together visitors of all ages for hands-on artmaking activities led by AGNS staff, artists, and art educators. During monthly sessions, this program offered a range of techniques including block printing, papermaking, and clay. This year, Make Days saw record-breaking attendance!

## **Highlights included:**

Creating glow-in-the-dark wearable paper creations and collages, led by Sherry Lynn Jollymore, inspired by the neon colours and imaginative paintings in *VampSites*.

Exploring a family-friendly block-printmaking experience while learning about local plants and binding minijournals.

Making personalized buttons, fridge magnets, and cut-out vinyl stickers, led by artists P. Doak and Brigitta Zhao.

Papermaking with native wildflower seeds added in, to plant into a butterfly garden come spring, inspired by the work *Touched By The Tears* of a *Butterfly* by artist Mike MacDonald (1941-2006).

Creating felt portraits inspired by African Heritage Month and the theme of legacy, stories, and identity.

Creating clay creations led by artist Meggie Richards.

## Voices from Down Home: Dialogues on Community Connections in Black Canadian Art

In celebration of African Heritage Month, this talk featured several artists from the exhibition, Down Home, at the Dalhousie Art Gallery curated by AGNS' Fabiyino Germain-Bajowa. These artists shared layered stories that illuminate the strength and vibrancy of African Nova Scotian and Black Canadian life and identity. Presented in partnership with Dalhousie Art Gallery, Dalhousie African Nova Scotian Strategy Advisory Council, and Halifax Public Libraries.







## Book Launch for Halifax Art and Artists with Art Canada Institute

This event celebrated stories of Halifax's creators, from craftspeople and portrait painters to filmmakers and multidisciplinary makers.



#### **ArtReach & ArtsSmarts**

The ArtReach and ArtsSmarts programs provide engaging opportunities for artists to work with teachers and students, promoting and celebrating access to art across the province. These programs develop artmaking skills, support professional development for teachers, foster collaboration and inclusion among students and communities, and build understanding and appreciation of the arts. With the support of regional coordinators Adam Graham in Yarmouth, and Elizabeth Lalonde in Louisbourg, the AGNS hosted 196 sessions of ArtsSmarts and ArtReach and engaged more than 2,259 students in formative experiences with artists.

#### **School Visits**

School tours are designed to engage students from pre-primary to post-secondary level learners during their visit to the Gallery. With opportunities to engage with art materials during their tour, students also participate in hands-on artmaking that encourages reflection and additional learning to complement their visit.

#### **Volunteer Guide Program**

The AGNS volunteer guide program warmly embraces art enthusiasts whose dedication and commitment to leading tours and engaging with visitors through our Ask Me program makes a trip to the AGNS inspiring and memorable. ### Autism Arts – Halifax and Yarmouth

Developed in 2006 in collaboration with Autism Nova Scotia, Autism Arts is a weekly art class for children, youth, and young adults. Art can be an effective and inspiring tool for self-expression, especially for those with unique needs. Classes are designed to create opportunities for those on the autism spectrum by presenting a variety of meaningful experiences through art. This year, classes took place weekly in Halifax, led by artist Agne Kubiliute, and in Yarmouth at YACRO, led by artist Jay LeBlanc, with the help of dedicated volunteers.

#### **Artful Afternoon**

Since 2014, the Alzheimer Society of Nova Scotia and the AGNS have been offering Artful Afternoon, a program designed to engage people living with dementia and their partners in care through the power of art. This year, participants had the pleasure of working with artist-facilitator Sarah Mosher, who led them through meaningful and inspiring experiences including exhibition visits and hands-on activities, both in-person and virtually.

#### **March Break**

This March Break happened in and out of the Gallery.
The AGNS popped up at the Halifax North Library and Halifax Shopping Centre to offer accessible drop-in artmaking opportunities. Plus, our March Break Art Camps allowed campers aged 5-12 to get creative screen-printing t-shirts, building papier mâché sculptures, and more, all led by local practicing artists.

#### **Memory Cafe**

The AGNS has partnered with Memory Café NS to enhance the experience for individuals living with dementia, their care partners, and families. In the inaugural year of this collaboration, AGNS provided reproductions of Maud Lewis works from the Permanent Collection, enriching sessions and making the art more accessible to participants.

This year, the program hosted five sessions over the winter and spring at 16 sites across the province and reached over 250 participants.

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


# 2024-25 ACQUISITIONS








